

French Secondary Education Track

- In addition to the General Education requirements and the requirements specified by the Department of Secondary Education, students must complete 30 French units with a grade equivalent of 3.00 or higher before the semester of student teaching.
- Students are also required to complete the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) and the Writing Proficiency Test (WPT). See detailed information below.
- Students are assigned two advisors: one in the Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultures and one in the Department of Secondary and Middle School Education.

Native and Heritage speakers of French may earn up to 6 units for FREN 301 and FREN 302 by taking the department's Credit for Prior Learning Exam. See further information below.

Oral Proficiency Interview and Writing Proficiency Test

As part of the requirements for graduation, teacher candidates must complete the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) and the Writing Proficiency Test (WPT).

- The OPI is normally administered on a rolling basis. Please, contact Prof. Martínez Ibarra (fmartinezibarra@towson.edu) to consult about application procedures and scheduling. The test is conducted by an interviewer certified by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL.) The requirement should be completed no later than the end of the semester in which the candidate is enrolled in SCED 499, "Internship in Secondary Education."
- To complete the WPT, teacher candidates have two options.
 - o Take the test online by selecting "web-based proctoring."
 - o Take the test on campus. The WPT is proctored once per semester by a faculty member in the Dept. of Languages, Literatures and Cultures – normally, in November and May.
 - o Whether we decide to take the WPT online or on campus, we need to register at www.languageTesting.com
 - Select Spanish as the language you are testing, click on "programs with ACTFL requirements," choose Towson University as your institution, select ACTFL WPT, choose your proctor.
 - If you are taking the WPT on campus, make sure you contact Prof. Martínez Ibarra (fmartinezibarra@towson.edu) in advance to find out when the test will be proctored on campus that semester. You will need to enter that date and time as your first option.
- Teacher candidates from Towson University who are seeking certification in Maryland are required to achieve a level of Advanced Low on the OPI. The requirement for the WPT is Intermediate High.
- The Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultures will provide numerous opportunities for candidates to meet the required proficiency standards through its study abroad programs; service-learning opportunities; tutoring; language clubs; and on-campus events such as film festivals and guest speakers. Students are also encouraged to seek out additional opportunities through volunteer work requiring their language skills; through participation in practice groups with other language students and native speakers on campus; and through viewing films and television programs in the language they will be teaching.

Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) – Challenge Exam

The Department of Languages, Literatures & Cultures offers a Challenge Exam to native and heritage speakers and writers of Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Hebrew, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, and Spanish. Students can elect to test for a total of 6 credits.

This exam is not the same thing as the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) exam given through the College Board. The Department of Languages, Literatures & Cultures does not recognize CLEP credits.

Professional Behavior

The Teacher Education Executive Board (TEEB) reserves the right for each department/program to refuse, deny, or revoke the application for admission to professional education programs or continuation in professional education programs of any student whose observed conduct is deemed incongruent with established guidelines of professional behavior.

As a professional discipline, education is “vested by the public with a trust and responsibility requiring the highest ideals of professional service.” All teacher education students agree to accept “the responsibility to adhere to the highest ethical standards of professional behavior.” Placing the

importance of professional behavior and duties above one's own convenience is the cornerstone of professionalism.

All teacher education students are responsible for understanding Unit, department- and program-specific professional expectations. In addition to fulfilling all academic requirements, successful completion of all field experiences requires demonstrated professional behavior including, but not limited to, punctuality, attendance, professional attire, discretion, respect for confidentiality, effective and appropriate communication with University and school-based students and personnel, and acceptance of diversity.

The same principles and guidelines that apply to students' activities in general also apply to their activities online. This includes all forms of online publishing and discussion, including blogs, user-generated video and audio, social networks and other social media applications. The Internet is neither anonymous nor forgetful, and there is no clear line between one's professional life and personal life on a social media site. Teacher candidates need to weigh every posting for how it affects their effectiveness as teachers.

All teacher education students must exhibit behavior that is consistent with the University's Code of Conduct, the Unit's Professional Behavior Policy, and established professional practice in educational and clinical settings. Successful completion of all field experiences is a requirement for continuation in the education program.
